Since its founding in 1978, the DVO has performed over 100 complimentary concerts at local Long-Term Care and Retirement Residences. Small ensembles involving over 30 members of the DVO performed holiday concerts for over 200 residents and staff at four seniors' residences in Dundas last November – December, and were very well-received. A local Scout troop attended a DVO rehearsal to experience close-up the preparations leading up to the fall concert. DVO groups also performed at Arts Dundas Weekend and at the Dundas Cactus Festival.

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#### Laura Thomas, conductor



Laura Thomas is a conductor, arranger, composer, percussionist and teacher. She is Music Director of the *Dundas Valley Orchestra*, as well as Artistic Director of the Hamilton/Niagara area *WomEnchant Chorus & Drummers* and conductor of Hamilton's *Singin' Women* chorus. Her past positions include over ten years as Music Director

of the *Niagara Youth Orchestra* and six years as Artistic Director of the Niagara based chamber choir, *Choralis Camerata*. She is also the Principal Percussionist of the *Niagara Symphony Orchestra* where she also served as Associate Conductor for thirteen years. Along with acclaimed flutist Douglas Miller, she developed the *Flutes en Route!* programs of orchestral, ensemble and educational concerts.

Her guest conducting appearances include *Symphony on the Bay* (Burlington), the *Huronia Symphony, Etobicoke Philharmonic*, the *North York Concert Orchestra*, and the *Bard Chamber Orchestra*. She was for many years, Director of the *Niagara College Jazz Band*. Ms. Thomas holds a masters degree in conducting from New York's prestigious Bard College, where she studied with Harold Farberman. She is also a graduate of Hamilton's Mohawk College and McMaster University, where she studied percussion and composition.

In addition to her percussionist position with the *Niagara Symphony Orchestra*, she has performed with many ensembles throughout Southern Ontario and Western New York, including the *Buffalo Philharmonic*, the *Hamilton Philharmonic*, the *Te Deum Baroque Orchestra*, and the *Aradia Ensemble*. She is a member of Niagara's popular eclectic folk/blues band *BroadBand*, and performs regularly with her *Vintage Jazz* ensembles.

Ms. Thomas has written music for symphony orchestras, choirs, small ensembles, jazz groups, and solos. Her compositions and arrange-

ments can be heard in the orchestra and ensemble repertoire of *Flutes* en Route! featuring Douglas Miller and in the performances and recordings of BroadBand. In 2012 she composed and recorded the soundtrack for the play "Bullying Hurts" by Monica Dufault and produced by Mainstream Services in St. Catharines and, in March 2013, her Concerto for Jazz Trio and Orchestra was premiered by John Sherwood and the Niagara Youth Orchestra. Her recording credits include the Aradia Ensemble CD for Naxos Records, "Ballet Music for the Sun King", the Niagara College Jazz Band's "On the Move", Rich Blend's self titled CD, sisterLune's "Wonder", and BroadBand's "LIVE at the Black Sea Hall" and "BroadBand".

Ms. Thomas has been actively committed to music education in the Niagara area for over two decades. She served as the Artistic Director of the *Niagara Symphony's* acclaimed Summer Music Camp for over twenty years, and she is the driving force behind the development of

The Academy, an intensive music study programme for senior students, which runs concurrently with the Summer Music Camp. She teaches conducting and percussion at Mohawk College in Hamilton and maintains a private studio. She designed and presented the popular Composer in the Classroom program to thousands of students in the Niagara area and, in 2019 composed the Kinder Concerto for students and orchestra which was premiered by the Dundas Valley Orchestra and students from St. Augustine School in Dundas in November 2019.

#### My Fair Lady

George Bernard Shaw wrote the comedy *Pygmalion* in 1913, the story of a London Cockney street flower seller Eliza Doolittle and Professor Henry Higgins, a linguist who wagers that he can teach her to speak proper English and pass for a proper lady in society. 1938 saw a film version of Pygmalion, with Shaw providing some new scenes, including the "Rain in Spain is Mainly in the Plain", which were not in the original theatrical version. Director Gabriel Pascal wanted to commission a musical version of the play, but Shaw refused and it was only after his death in 1950 that Pascal approached Lerner and Loewe to produce a musical based on the 1938 film. At first, they found the play difficult to adapt, as it isn't a love story, has no role for a chorus, and no subplot. But in 1955 they made a second attempt, and My Fair Lady opened to wide acclaim on Broadway in 1956, with Julie Andrews as Eliza and Rex Harrison as Higgins. The musical swept the 1957 Tony Awards, winning seven (including Best Musical), and the 1964 film version (with Audrey Hepburn replacing Andrews) won 8 Academy Awards. It presents an almost embarrassingly rich collection of unforgettable songs, including "Wouldn't It Be Loverly?", "On the Street Where You Live", "I Could Have Danced All Night", "Show Me", "With a Little Bit of Luck", "Get Me to the Church on Time", and "I've Grown Accustomed to her Face", which are featured in this arrangement.

#### Beauty and the Beast

Written for the 1991 animated film of the same name, the theme song was written by Alan Menken with lyrics by Howard Ashman. The vocal was recorded by actress Angela Lansbury, who plays an enchanted teapot named Mrs. Potts in the film. Although Lansbury first gained fame in dramatic roles in *Gaslight*, *National Velvet*, and *The Manchurian Candidate*, she also played the lead in the musicals *Mame* and *Sweeney Todd* on Broadway, and a West End production of *Gypsy*.

#### It Had to Be You

Isham Jones was a popular band leader in the 1920s and early 1930s, with many hit recordings of jazz standards. Among the musicians who played with Isham Jones' Rainbo Orchestra were Benny Goodman,

Woody Herman, Roy Bargy, and a young singer named Bing Crosby. Jones composed the song "It Had to Be You" in 1924 as an instrumental, and Gus Kahn added lyrics shortly afterwards. The song has been heard in many films over the years: by Dooley Wilson in *Casablanca*, by Danny Thomas in *Mr. Skeffington*, by Ginger Rogers in *It Had to Be You*, by Diane Keaton in *Annie Hall*, and as the main theme of *When Harry Met Sally*.

#### Mission: Impossible Theme

This unforgettable riff was written by Argentine composer Lalo Schifrin for the television series *Mission: Impossible*, which aired from 1966 to 1973. With its unsettling 5/4 time signature and bold rhythmic palette, it mimics the Morse code for the letters M and I, two dashes followed by two dots. Schifrin's original title was "Burning Fuse", and he joked that it was dance music for people with five legs. It won two Grammy awards in 1968, for Best Instrumental and Best Original Score.

#### Cello Concerto #1 in C major

Haydn composed his first cello concerto sometime around 1761-65, while serving as court musician at the Eszterháza Castle in what is now Hungary. Although the principal theme of the first movement appears among his draft compositions from 1765, the full work went missing until it was rediscovered at the Prague National Museum in 1961. It is an early composition, written at around the same time as his 6th symphony (of 106 produced during a long and productive lifetime), and the structure is very much like the Baroque concerto grosso, with only a small orchestra by the standards of the Classical era which he was to introduce with his later work. Haydn wrote the concerto for his friend Joseph Franz Weigl, who was first cellist with the Eszterházy orchestra. The solo part demands a great deal of virtuosity on the instrument, with full chords requiring playing all four strings at once, rapid changes, and many high notes. It has become a favorite among modern cellists, including Yo Yo Ma, Mstislav Rostropovich, Jacqueline du Pré, and Mischa Maisky.

#### Great Themes from Great Western Movies

Some of the most memorable movie themes were written for Westerns. For *The Magnificent Seven*, John Sturges' star-studded remake of Kurasawa's *The Seven Samurai*, Elmer Bernstein provided a bold anthem which evokes horsemen riding across vast western plains. Bernstein was one of the great film composers, and wrote for *The Great Escape*, *Hud*, *Ghostbusters*, and *Cape Fear* among others. *High Noon*, with Gary Cooper and Grace Kelly, is a story of duty and moral principle in the face of danger. The theme song, by Dimitri Tiomkin with lyrics by Ned Washington, was a hit for Tex Ritter in 1952, when it also won the Oscar for Best Original Song. *How the West Was Won* was an epic 1962 production with five vignettes featuring many of the greatest names in Hollywood. The score was written by Alfred Newman, and includes three songs (sung by Debbie Reynolds).

#### Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire

This was the fourth film in the Harry Potter series, based on the novels by J.K. Rowling, and released in 2005. The music for the first three movies had been composed by John Williams, but he was unavailable for the *Goblet of Fire*, and Patrick Doyle was chosen to compose the score. "Hedwig's Theme", which runs as a leitmotif throughout the series, is the only Williams melody retained in this sequel which introduces new themes for arch-villain Voldemort, the Triwizard Tournament, and Harry's new love interest Cho Chang. The "Potter Waltz", played during the Yule Ball, is adapted from a symphony by 18<sup>th</sup> century composer Samuel Wesley.

#### You've Got a Friend in Me

Randy Newman is a Californian singer and songwriter, known for his whimsical or satirical lyrics. He has also written several film scores, including *Cold Turkey* (1971), *the Natural* (1984), and *Awakenings* (1990). "You've Got a Friend in Me" was written for the 1995 animated feature *Toy Story*. Newman also recorded a single as a duet with Lyle Lovitt the following year. Since that time Newman has written scores for nine Disney-Pixar animations, including *James and the Giant Peach* and *Monsters, Inc.* 

#### **West Side Story**

This adaptation of *Romeo and Juliet*, set in the gritty streets on Manhattan's upper west side where the Puerto Rican Sharks gang fights with the white Jets, was conceived and directed by choreographer Jerome Robbins with music by Leonard Bernstein and lyrics by Stephen Sondheim. The original Broadway production opened to critical acclaim in 1957, and starred Larry Kert, Carol Lawrence, and Chita Rivera. It was a dazzling spectacle, groundbreaking in the sophistication of the music, the choreography, and the acting talent demanded of its principals. The 1961 movie version, with Natalie Wood, Rita Moreno (who won the Oscar for Best Supporting Actress), and Richard Beymer, was the most popular movie of the year and won the Oscar for Best Picture. The songbook is outstanding, with tunes which have become standards: "Maria", "I Feel Pretty", "Tonight", "Something's Coming", "One Hand, One Heart", "Cool", and "America", which you will hear today.

#### Don't Rain on My Parade

Merrill and Styne composed the 1964 musical *Funny Girl*, the story of Zeigfeld Follies showgirl Fanny Brice in the years around the First World War. The role of Brice was first offered to Anne Bancroft, then to Eydie Gormé and Carol Burnett before it was finally given to the young and little-known Barbra Streisand, who made the role her own. The movie version was Streisand's first appearance on the big screen, and it was the top-selling film of 1968, magnificently launching her acting career. Streisand shared the Oscar for Best Actress with Katherine Hepburn. "Don't Rain on My Parade" showcases Streisand's extraordinary range and the dynamic power of her voice.

#### Pirates of the Caribbean

The Curse of the Black Pearl was the first Pirates story in a series of five films. It features Johnny Depp as Captain Jack Sparrow, who rescues Elizabeth Swann (Keira Knightly) from the clutches of rival buccaneer Barbarossa (Geoffrey Rush). The series is based on a popular ride at Disneyland, and the debut episode introduces a subplot involving a cursed Aztec treasure. Klaus Badelt is a German composer of music for blockbuster films. His *Pirates of the Caribbean* is appropriately brassy and swashbuckling, with a rocking rhythm of the boat on the sea and a martial flair. His score for the film was nominated for four awards in 2003.
