Anecdotes of Great Musicians

Frederick Delius January 29, 1862 - June 10, 1934

The German-born parents of Frederick Delius were so set upon his becoming a businessman that neither of them ever would listen to one of his compositions, even after he became famous. Misled by the young man's professed desire to raise oranges in Florida, they staked him to an orange grove in Jacksonville. Once there, his first act was to buy a piano. Then, oblivious of whether his oranges ripened or not, he worked daily at music, with the local organist, Thomas Ward, as teacher. When his father next heard from him, after a lapse of time, he had deserted the oranges, and had gone to teach music in Jacksonville. He was retrieved and, since there was no way out, was sent to the Leipzig Conservatory. In 1897 he married a painter, Jelka Roszen, and made his home in a villa near Fontainebleau.

When the Germans invaded France in 1914, he took refuge in England, where his countrymen were just beginning to become aware that there was an Englishman named Delius who wrote music. His works were played and respected in Germany, but they remained almost unknown in France, his home for forty-five years, and were not recognized in England until the latter part of his life.

Delius became paralyzed, blind and helpless 10 years before he died: still, he dictated music to his wife and his secretary until the very end. In 1929, he visited London, and attended in a wheelchair six concerts of his works conducted by his devoted admirer, Sir Thomas Beecham. It was his last visit to his native land.

Delius was the first English impressionist, as Debussy was the first in France. To compare them is not to place his inspiration on a par with the matchless Debussy's. His place in music has not been fully agreed upon, but he is undoubtedly one of the better English composers. *Sea-drift*, based on Walt Whitman's poem, the symphonic poem, *Appalachia*, and the opera *Koanga* are reminiscent of his stay in the United States. *Brigg Fair, Summer Night on the River, On Hearing the First Cuckoo in Spring, In a Summer Garden*, and *North Country Sketches*, are English in the folksong, countryside sense. They are pictorial, and at the same time subjective in that they convey the composer's impressions of the scenes they describe. This combination is characteristic of Delius, and is coming to be better understood as his works become better known.


